## County receives \$2.4 million in security funding

#### **By John Johnston** MANAGING EDITOR

Some \$2.4 million in Homeland Security funding - about 24 percent of the regional funds available - have been awarded to Palm Beach County under the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI).

Palm Beach County commissioners' acceptance of the funding extends the county's involvement in the program through June 30, 2009, commissioners said.

Palm Beach County is part of Fort Lauderdale area UASI - and actually receives its funding under the program from the City of Miramar, designated when the USAI was established in 2004 as the region's USAI fiscal agent. The specific USAI allocations were:

• \$698,600 to the county, to fund fire, health, emergency management, and other approved anti-terrorism activities.

• \$698.600 to the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO) to fund direct law enforcement activities

• \$985,887 to fund regional security projects, in concert with other counties and cities.

The USAI program is part of a five-part package of programs that, according to the DHS, are designed "to enhance the ability of state, local, and tribal governments to prevent, protect against, respond to, and recover from terrorist attacks and other disasters."

The DHS core programs are:

• Homeland Security Grant Program

1. State Homeland Security Program (SHSP)

2. Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI)

3. Metropolitan Medical Response System

4. Citizen Corps Program (CCP)

• SHSP Supplemental Guidance for Tribal Applicants

• Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP)

• Operation Stonegarden Grant Program (OPSG)

• Regional Catastrophic Planning Grant Program (RCPGP)

According to DHS, "Together, these grants may fund a wide range of preparedness activities, to include planning, organization, equipment purchase, training, exercises, and management and administration costs. These five programs support



objectives outlined in the National Preparedness Guidelines and related national preparedness doctrine, such as the national incident management system, national response plan, and the national infrastructure protection plan.'

Commissioners said future USAI funding would be "based on a competitive need process," and that no county funds are involved.

## County approves CDBGextension; **PBSOroof rental with Marriot**

Palm Beach County commissioners have approved a five-month extension of an agreement with the City of Delray Beach for the expenditure of \$252,500 in 2005 Disaster Recovery Initiative Program funds.

Commissioners said the funds come from Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, and were approved for the extension of Mango Drive and SW 7th Avenue in Delray Beach. The

time extension is needed, commissioners said, because of delays in obtaining rights-of-way permissions.

#### **PBSO Equipment**

Separately in Delray, and on behalf of the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO), commissioners have approved an agreement with Tallmar, Inc., for the placement of communication equipment on the roof of the Marriott Residence Inn on East Atlantic Avenue, A separate agreement was also approved providing for PBSO's financial responsibility for rent

Commissioners said the 10year agreement permits the installation of radar and other miscellaneous communication equipment "which will enhance maritime security and improve communication between local law enforcement agencies."

The Marriott will charge an annual rent of \$4,000, commissioners said, and which will be increased annually according to the Consumer Price Index. In turn, the county has the option to terminate the



agreement for any reason with 90 days notice to the Marriot. In turn, the Marriot has the right to terminate upon 180 days notice and payment of an \$8,000 early termination fee, said commissioners.

## Boca family remembers son on 9-11

#### SEEKS USED CELL PHONES FOR OTHER SOLDIERS

For many, September 11, even seven years later, is a day that will never be forgotten. For the Wolfer family of Boca Raton, the day also marks a harsh reminder of a son lost while protecting our country.

Major Stuart Adam Wolfer was killed April 6, 2008, while serving in Iraq. On that fateful day, he was working out in a fitness center in the Green Zone, which is a non-combat area, and a mortar attack took his life. He was only 36 and leaves behind a loving family, wife Lee and three daughters, Lillian, Melissa, and Isadora.

That Boca family said they never expected Stuart would pass before his time, especially since they believed he was in a safe zone.

"We thought our son was safe. He was a Major and not in combat," said his father Leonard Wolfer. "Not a day passes that we don't think of him and try not to be sad." His sister Beverly Wolfer-

Nerenberg added, "His life did not end April 6, he will be remembered forever."

Boca Raton Community High School recently honored Wolfer's memory and also remembered others who lost lives on 9-11. The school held an assembly with performances from the NJROTC and chorus to honor the 7th anniversary.

"It was a beautiful ceremony," said Boca High principal Geoff McKee. "We as a nation have turned our greatest tragedy into one of our greatest triumphs, with our country uniting."

#### Soldier Remembered

The family says Stuart will be remembered as a loving father, brother, son and friend. They have received over 500 letters and even college donations for his children's education.

"He had special friendships around the world," said his sister.

His parents describe Stuart as a soldier who had many friends and always gave 110 percent. "There was nothing he couldn't do, and he brought out the best in everyone," said his father, Leonard.

His mother Esther added, "He had such a warm smile and would look at you directly when he spoke to you."

#### Help Other Soldiers

In the meantime, the Wolfer family has been helping other soldiers who are serving overseas. Esther has been spearheading the project, Cell Phones for Soldiers, a national organization that collects used cell phones and then sends calling cards to soldiers so they can talk to loved ones.

"With Stuart being an officer, we were very fortunate to be able to talk to him through email and phone, but many families of combat soldiers do not have those advantages," said Esther.

The Wolfer family hopes locals will contribute to the cause and drop off used cell phones to help soldiers.

Boca High School NJROTC has started a campaign at the school to collect cell phones. NJROTC Lieutenant Commander Ken Bingham says the students have already col-

lected over 350 cell phones and have a goal of collecting 1,000 cell phones by December.

"We are doing this to remember Major Wolfer. Also, his parents wanted to keep the project going because he believed soldiers should have the opportunity to call home when stationed overseas," Bingham said.

# County approves inland port south of Big Lake

### PORT OF PALM BEACH LANDLOCKED

While not exactly sure where to put it, Palm Beach County commissioners unanimously support the creation of a socalled "inland port" somewhere near South Bay in the Glades area.

The more than 3,500 acre facility would employ more than 3,000 persons, and proponents said would solidify Palm Beach County as the link between both East and West coast ports, and in turn, the regions rail lines and roads. Hundreds of Glades area residents – many of whom are unemployed, or who will be unemployed when US Sugar completes sale of its land to the State of Florida -- showed up last week to lobby for the construction of the inland port. "We want jobs, so that we can take care of our families, "said one man, echoing the sentiments of many who spoke.

Creation of an inland port is actually an idea of the Port of Palm Beach itself. The port is landlocked, and doesn't have "adequate physical expansion opportunities." according to a County Overall Economic Development Committee (OEDP) report.

"Terminal size constraints are impacting its ability to attract new port business to Palm Beach County," the report said, adding: "An inland port facility....would serve the Port as a direct extension of its waterside terminal."

In turn, and at the Port's request, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) agreed to conduct a study to determine the feasibility of such a facility, "providing a hub of port-related operations and storage facilities, with truck and rail connections to the region's seaports, with truck access to regional markets," the ODEP report said.



would interfere with the ongoing Everglades restoration project, commissioners voted in favor of moving forward.

With the 5-2 vote, commissioners directed staff to initiate the process of amending the comprehensive plan to create an industrial overlay district along the US 27 corridor south of Lake Okeechobee.

## TAKING STOCK

## Murphy's Law Figures in Buying Mutual Funds

The staff and management of the Boca Raton News don't necessarily agree with the assessments and/ or subsequent conclusions reached by Malcolm Berko.

Dear Mr. Berko:

Until the middle of 2006, Legg Mason's Value Fund, the Muhlenkamp Fund and Oakmark Select had all been big winners with 10-year average returns in excess of 12 percent. In the past two years, these funds have been real laggards. But what's different about there funds is that they are the only mutuals with portfolios of fewer than 40 stocks when all others have hundreds of issues in their portfolios. So, I'm thinking of investing \$10,000 in each and request your analysis of them. Should I buy them now, should I buy a small piece of each now and more at later intervals, or should I decline to invest in one or any of them? I expect to hold

each fund for at least 6 to 10 years. I've had good success in the past buying stocks that have been beaten down and holding them long-term till they move back up. But I've never done it with funds. Have they reached bottom or do you think it will take more time before they go back up?

E.B., Fort Walton Beach, Fla.

Dear E.B.:

I'm familiar with Isaac observations in Newton's his "Philosophiae Naturalis Principia Mathematica" saying anything that goes up must come down. But I'm more concerned with Sean Murphy's law and its relationship to Newton's law: "When something comes down, it won't come down where you expect unless you don't expect it to, then, at that point, it will." Albert Einstein addressed the phenomena in his discussions of quantum mechanics.

Bill Miller runs Legg Mason's Value Trust Inc., which is down 31 percent this year. I don't know how much more it will fall. Miller reduced his portfolio from 48 to 31 positions to raise cash for ongoing redemptions. Legg Mason Value Trust (LMVTX-\$40.86) has bettered the S&P 500 for 15 consecutive years. But this year positions in United Health Services, Freddie Mac, Citigroup, Merrill Lynch, American international Group, Expedia and Quest, all down more than 40 percent, seem to have done him in. His other positions look like who's who on the Blue Chip Index (Amazon, JP Morgan, Aetna, eBay, Sears, GE, IBM, Time Warner, Cisco, Texas Instruments, etc) are no-brainers and will run back up only when the economy turns around. But, according to Murphy, that will happen when it is least expected to. So nibble now. It is a noload fund and the minimum investment is \$1,000.

The Muhlenkamp Fund (MUHLX-\$52.76), off 26 percent this year and 10 percent in 2007. Run by Ron Muhlenkamp, it has 40 positions and an average annual portfolio turnover of just 22 percent. During the last 19 years, this large-cap value fund has had four down years. Muhlenkamp positions investments in housing stocks, United Health Services and American International Group really bombed this year. So he's recently added Chevron, Boeing, Caterpillar Tractor and Exxon to his group, plus a sprinkling of tech issues, all of which he believes will rebound soon. However, Muhlenkamp has put his money where his mouth is with \$10 million of his personal cash. This fund will head back up only when there's a strong turnaround in the manufacturing sector. I don't see that happening for at least 12 to16 months. MUHLX is no-load and the minimum investment is \$1,500. Some would advise waiting until January to begin taking a position. But Murphy suggests that whenever you buy a fund could be the wrong time, and I think I agree with Sean.

Bill Nygren's Oakmark Fund (OAKLX-\$23.42) owns only 20 issues so each position really counts. Nygren got scorched in Pulte Homes, Washington Mutual and Discovery Holdings, earning a minus-24 percent return for the last 12 months. But this year has been boosted by his canny positions in YUM Brands, McDonalds, Western Union and H&R Block. This no-load fund has a 10-percent portfolio turnover and since inception in 1998 has only had two down years. I like OAKLX and I'm impressed that Nygren has a large personal cash position in his fund. His large investment in media stocks and consumer services might give the portfolio a boost this year and next. In this instance I believe the apple fell kind of close to the tree, so I would be comfortable owning shares of OAKLX right now.

However you have failed to consider the Fairholme Fund (FAIRX-\$31.40). Even though it's headquartered in Miami, this is one fund I would not bet against. Messrs Berkowitz, Pitkowsky and Trauner, managers of this 22 stock portfolio fund have handily bested the DOW and S&P since its inception in late 1999. While FAIRX may lag the market in volatile climates, its minus 5.2 percent return vs. the S&P's minus 13.5 percent (2008) is indicative of its of its superb performance in a Bear market. FAIRX has a 28 percent representation in financial stocks but you won't find mainstream



issues like Fannie Mae, Lehman, AIG or Citigroup. FAIRX uses the Buffet philosophy to select stocks (strong cash flow, solid assets and superior management) and its portfolio is 25 percent cash. Even though FAIRX hasn't crashed like MUHLX, LMUTX and OAKLX I'd own this Miami, Florida no-load fund in a heartbeat and forget about the other three. It seems that the laws of Mr. Newton and Mr. Murphy are applicable here.

## Judge rules Boca's approval of townhouses complied with law

An administrative law judge

has ruled that the Boca Raton City Council did not break Florida statutes when it approved a 211-unit townhouse on the western edge of the Boca Teeca Condominium complex, and also "amended the traffic element of the plan" affecting NW Second Avenue, which runs through the complex off Yamato Road, according to documents filed in the Division of Administrative Hearings, State of Florida.

The ruling of Judge Donald Alexander is not yet final, court officials said. It still must be approved by the state Department of Community Affairs, which had already reviewed the townhouse plan and given

the green light to the city's action.

The suit was filed against the city of Boca Raton and the DCA, with MCZ/Centrum Florida V as an intervener.

The matter ended up in court when Save Boca Green Space, an environmental group that had fought to scuttle the townhouse project and other amenities proposed by the developer, Dennis Taback of MCZ/Centrum Florida V owner of the Ocean Breeze Golf & Country Club at Boca Teeca - filed a petition for formal administrative hearing alleging that the two amendments were "not consistent with the requirements" of several sections of Florida law.

Save Boca Green Space alleged that the council had no right to change the designation of 29.58 acres of land from recreational and open space use to a residential medium district to make way for the 211 townhomes.

The group also claimed that the change in the transportation plan for NW Second Avenue "established a new level of service" for the road.

At several hearings on the Ocean Breeze development, city officials said NW Second Avenue is "a constrained road," not subject to widening. Those opposed to the project said the road could not handle the additional traffic from the townhouse complex. After a number of hearings and a review of the allegations, Administrative Judge Alexander ruled that the petitioner "has failed to establish beyond fair debate that the amendments are not in compliance. Therefore, the plan amendments adopted are in compliance."

He has asked the DCA to affirm his ruling.

## FAU sends English language books to Iraq, Armenia

Rogers Circle Ste 7 Boca Raton FL www.BocaNews.com Florida Atlantic University Libraries have redirected thousands of English language books that are not needed by its library users to Armenia and Iraq. University officials said this will enable librarians in those nations to augment collections and offer a larger variety of titles to readers.

The library's effort, which now includes a network of southeast Florida libraries as partners and an Iraqi university as a recipient, began after Dr. William Miller, dean of University Libraries at FAU, returned from Armenia following the September 2001 terrorist attacks.

The visit was Miller's first of three on behalf of the U.S. Department of State Speaker/ Consultant Program to do outreach with Armenian librarians.

"Before 1991, books to Soviet Bloc countries were provided free of charge centrally from Moscow, and of course, they were all in Russian," said Miller. "After the fall of the Soviet Union, the book shipments stopped, and the countries had no money to purchase books. By 2001, the libraries had basically acquired no books for a decade and also had little or nothing in English."

Miller and his staff at the S.E. Wimberly Library on FAU's Boca Raton campus began the project by setting aside appropriate books among duplicates from the gifts program. The first books shipped were mainly science and technology texts

of scientific research manuals. Miller occasionally tossed in books from his personal collection. "The emphasis was always on current, quality material, either in science or in history, literature and other areas of great interest," he said.

After the project got underway, Miller and Tom Sloan

and Tom Sloan, executive director of the Southeast Florida Library Information Network (SEFLIN), who has also visited Armenia many times as a consultant for the State Department, collaborated on how to provide ongoing assistance to Armenian libraries.

SEFLIN, which includes FAU Libraries among its membership of more than 300 libraries, assumed the project, named it the SEFLIN Gifts Book Program and began shipping books to Armenia in January 2006. The project's name has since been changed to the SEFLIN Gift Library Materials Program.

About 3,500 of the books shipped by SEFLIN have been academic titles, while about 3,200 have been books designated for grade schools and public libraries. More than 100 titles on the study of the English language have been do-

nated to language institutes.

FAU Libraries have given at least 55 percent of the books for the effort over the past two years. In addition, Lynn University, Palm Beach Community College, Lighthouse Point Library and members of the S.E. Florida Independent School Libraries Consortium have donated books, microfilm, videotapes and other library materials.

Amed Demirhan, library director of the University of Kurdistan Hawler Library, an English language university in Erbil, Iraq, said he has noticed a change in his students since his library began receiving the books. "The connectivity gives our students the feeling that they are part of the global community and not isolated anymore," said Demirhan, a former Broward County Library employee, who requested the books before returning home to Iraq.

# Anew track

#### FIRM EXPECTED TO DOWNSIZE PLANS FOR BOCA DEPOT 'VILLAGE'

Change is apparently in the works for a proposed development adjacent to the Boca Raton Tri-Rail station.

Yamato Road Joint Ventures LLC, which hoped to create a million square foot "transit village" next to the depot, is apparently re-thinking the plan — in particular, the size.

City officials have twice adopted strong resolutions saying the million square foot plan is much too large for that spot. Coincidentally, because of the change of administration earlier this year, one resolution came about through former Mayor Steven Abrams, the other under current Mayor Susan Whelchel. Peter Sachs of Sachs Sax Caplan, a Boca law firm representing Yamato Road Joint Ventures LLC, notified the City Council earlier this month that "Mike Langton and Tom Gustafson of Yamato Road LLC are proposing changes to the Yamato Road Tri-Rail development proposal."

Sachs' letter said the changes will result in "less mass," be "more likely to improve local traffic conditions" and be "more consistent with the city's effort to develop multi-modal transportation districts." The letter also says the changes are "more likely to create a basis for passenger rail travel in Boca Raton on the FEC (Florida East Coast) corridor when FEC passenger services are planned and implemented for other South Florida areas."

#### **Two Meetings**

The letter proposes a meeting between Yamato Road Joint Ventures LLC and the City Council Sept. 22 - four days before the firm

will make a similar presentation to the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority, which operates Tri-Rail.

Earlier this year, SFRTA chose Yamato Road Joint Ventures' plan as its preferred development choice over a second one submitted by Boca developers Malcolm Butters and Ned Siegel, which exactly fits the zoning on that plat.

A follow-up letter from Sachs said Butters will be present at the Sept. 22 meeting.

Mayor Susan Whelchel said she knows no specifics about the plans to be presented at the meeting, but has "two impressions. We have unanimously voted twice not to allow the development. Obviously, they got the message."

Her second impression is that the firm "knows we are committed to public transportation" and may tailor its proposal to that pledge.

Initially, Yamato Road LLC wanted to create a transit "village" with a hotel, apartments,

shops and offices. The firm's \$200 million proposal included a 150-room hotel, nearly 200 workforce housing units, 90,000 square feet of offices, 55,000 square feet of shops and parking garages with 1,731 spaces.

But the council twice rejected that plan by resolution, saying the zoning would not allow such massive development. While Tri-Rail owns the six-acre parcel near the train station, the city controls the zoning.

Regarding the upcoming meeting, Jack Stephens, deputy executive director of SFRTA issued a statement to the *Boca Raton News*: "The SFRTA Governing Board has made it clear that the involvement of the development team is with the local government. The site is very important to us and we look forward to the creation of a project that will benefit both the city of Boca Raton and our passengers."
